LIGHT IN THE LENS

"Embrace light. Admire it. Love it. But above all, know light. Know it for all you are worth, and you will know the key to photography" George Eastman

There are many facets of photography that combine to enable the photographer to take a successful photograph. Some are more important than others. But one aspect is absolutely essential, for without light, photography itself would not exist. Light is the foundation of every photograph ever taken. It gives shape, texture and colour to our images. It allows us to create a certain mood or atmosphere and determines how the shot will look, and the message that it will convey.

Many photographers spend hours chasing the light, in search of the perfect conditions that will allow them to capture not only a snapshot but a powerful and evocative image. They often swear by the so-called "golden hour" as the time of day with the best lighting. Referring to the first hour of light after sunrise and the last hour of light before sunset, the golden hour is when the sun is low in the sky, producing a soft, diffused light. Portraits, landscapes and still life benefit in particular from this special light.

Whatever the scene that you wish to capture through your view finder, without the right light you will have difficulty producing an image that is inspiring, dramatic and above all impactful.

The images that feature in this exhibition all explore the effect that light can have on the outcomes of photographic pursuits. Some examine the interplay of light and shadow, others the use of highlights, contrast and saturation. Some experiment with long exposure in order to paint with light. What all these photographs have in common is the way in which the light has transformed each image into something dramatic and special.

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Sanjiban Ghosh



Richard Mills

Richard first became interested in photography at the age of 11 when he was given his first camera (a Kodak Ektra 12). From there he progressed to 35mm compact cameras and then bought himself his first SLR at the age of 14.

He went on to study architecture at university; this provided him with lots of opportunities to pursue his interest in architectural photography as well as experimenting with photography as the starting point for site illustrations and renderings. He transferred from the architecture course after 3 years and successfully completed a degree in computer science.

Following his graduation, he started working for Marks & Spencer (in their IT department). His interest in photography was renewed at around this time having been neglected somewhat during his IT degree.

Richard bought his first digital camera and went from shooting half a dozen rolls of film per year to shooting over 4000 images. Whilst at Marks & Spencer, he received his first commercial commission, which enabled him to significantly upgrade and improve his kit as well as providing him with valuable experience.




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PHOTOGRAPHER PROFILES

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
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PHOTOGRAPHER PROFILES

Adee has always loved capturing pictures and says "Photography has been a passion of mine since my childhood, now I have taken it further than I ever thought possible. I have turned my Asperger's Syndrome into a positive and have dedicated the time to pushing my photography to be more creative and eye catching than it has ever been".



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Maurice Wilson

Maurice started photography as a hobby in 2007 at the tender age of 61 and doesn't really have a special type of picture that he wishes to achieve. Rather the reverse. He will take a picture of anything if it catches his eye. Being a late starter he doesn't yet have the skills of really knowing the ability of his camera, so tends to leave the setting on P and adjusts the ISO according to the light. This has worked quite well for him up till now.

Photoshop really interests Maurice. He colour corrects his work on the computer because what he sees when capturing the image, rarely, if ever comes out on screen. If he were to print without colour correction, he is afraid his work would be dull and lifeless. That is why he chooses to shoot in RAW format, as it allows for the maximum amount of detail to be captured by the camera and he can then tweak it to the best of his ability using Photoshop.

Being a member of his local camera club (North Manchester Camera Club) has been tremendously helpful to Maurice. From day one he has received constructive criticism, which has pushed him from taking ordinary pictures to taking much better ones in his opinion.

Wu Hao

Wu Hao is an emerging photographer born in Nanning city, the capital of the southern province of Guangxi. He is currently based in Beijing, China and specialises in documentary, reportage and street photography. He purchased his first camera in 2007 and soon became passionate about photography. In this series of work I have tried to capture the relationship between light and my subject. Light is, for me, the most important element in bringing things to life in front of my lens. With average light I can see the surface but with good light I can see stories.

She participates in many competitions, paints, dances ballet, plays the piano, guitar and in general is experimental in all kinds of work. Dovile was nominated for a Youth prize in the category 'Air and Technology' by the European Environment Agency in 2013 with her project 'Rangers of the Universe'. How would you depict fear, stress, tension and pressure? Knowing and understanding ballet dancers better, you observe that their psychology and experiences are unique. They are under pressure from childhood to be perfect dancers and to continuously achieve their goals. Constant and exhaustive tasks, fears of suffering physical trauma and pre-competition weight gain along with aspirations of excellence - that inspires me to attempt to analyze and interpret the hidden feelings of ballet dancers through photography.
